FROM OUR ASSOCIATE PASTOR'S DESK

Surely, we do not need...letters of recommendation to you or from you, do we? You yourselves are our letter, written on our hearts, known and read by all, and you show that you are a letter of Christ, prepared by us, written not with ink but with the Spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone but on tablets that are human hearts.

2 Corinthians 3:1-3 (NRSV)

As I write this Pastor's note, three new, bonded leather Bibles sit conspicuously in a stack upon my desk. In two weeks' time, I'll have the joy of presenting these Bibles to the three young women who make up this year's Jesse Lee Church confirmation class. Whether any one of them choose to be confirmed or not—for it is their decision, and theirs alone—every one of them will be offered a Bible as a gift. Each Bible will have a confirmand's name engraved upon the front cover, so there'll be no mistaking whose is whose.

What's in a name? Certainly, more than the jumble of vowels and consonants it takes to spell one. In our names, we discover our distinctiveness. We speak our names and claim them, because whatever else they are, they are ours. Yet our names also turn us outward. They remind of the people who, in varied tones of voice and for still more varied reasons, have called us by name over the years. From them, we've learned that our names aren't always pleasant to hear, but we've also learned that they can be, and that when somebody who loves us calls us by name, it is a source of profound joy. To be named in love is to be claimed in the sense that we all long to be claimed: claimed as in spoken for, bothered about, accepted, and embraced.

We engrave our confirmands' names upon their Bibles because we believe that they—and we, with them—are each one of God's beloved. We carry God's mark, a Maker's mark, engraved, as the Apostle Paul writes, upon our hearts. No two marks are the same, but they all confer the same gift: the call of the One who, in ways that go far beyond birth certificates and monogrammed towels, names us in love again and again. A Bible with one's own name engraved upon it is a reminder that there are no preconditions to being named, claimed, and called: no recommendation letters, no entrance exams, no secret passwords. There is only grace, freely offered, which we are free to do with what we will.

For the past several months, our confirmands have been considering what they would like to do with it. This consideration isn't confined to confirmation class, of course, because to live as one who bears Christ's name is to always be about the business of confirmation: looking to the teachings of Scripture, the framework of the Christian faith as it has come to us, the hard-won wisdom of the old and the audacious observations of the young, the advice of our own senses and sensibilities, and most of all, the God who looks to make God's self known in all of that, and asking ourselves how we, in this moment, are being called to name in love the One who first bothered about each of us.

What's in a name? Jack, Jill, Paul, Silas, Abba, Father, Jesus, Christ. Perhaps it's not so much in the name as in the naming.



Heart of the Matter: The Couris

The Couri family has lived in Ridgefield Connecticut since 1974. Elaine Couri, formerly Elaine Conklin, was born and raised in Ridgefield. She attended Ridgefield schools from kindergarten through high school, graduating high school in 1956. Elaine has been a member of Jesse Lee Methodist Church since March 1951 (a period of over 72 years). Elaine is the second longest member at Jesse Lee, second only to Dottie Lockwood.

After graduating from Ridgefield high school in 1956, Elaine attended the University of Connecticut before taking a position with American Airlines, at JFK, checking in passengers for various flights.

John, a Brooklyn native, graduated from Syracuse University in 1963 and served in the US Army stationed in Germany for two years as a first lieutenant. He was living in Larchmont, New York when he met Elaine at Kennedy airport. John was a cofounder of a Duty-Free business that had shops in the American Airlines terminal building at JFK. John and Elaine got married in 1974 at Jesse Lee Church and settled down on an eight-acre farm located in Ridgefield on Ramapoo

Road and Mulberry Street.



In 1976, Elaine and John adopted Christopher, a four-month-old boy from Bogota, Columbia. After 13 years at American Airlines, Elaine quit her job to take care of Christopher. He grew up in Ridgefield, graduating from Ridgefield High School in 1994 and Babson College in 1998.

While raising Chris, John was President and CEO of Duty Free International, Inc., a company headquartered in Ridgefield Connecticut that employed over 2500 people. The company had 187 Duty Free Stores located at International Airports and on the US side of the Canadian and Mexican borders. This company was listed on the New York Stock Exchange and was sold to a British conglomerate in 1997. John is a trustee at Syracuse University and was chairman of the board of trustees from 1984 to 1989.



Christopher married Megan Dayton, from Brookfield Connecticut, in 2003 at Jesse Lee Church. Chris has two businesses based in Ridgefield. He owns Youngs of Ridgefield, a fencing and landscaping business and We Do Lines, a line striping business that does parking lot line striping as well as airport gate striping at airports from Boston to Florida. Megan Couri is also an entrepreneur in her own right, doing pediatric

occupational therapy as well as being a certified Reiki instructor. Chris and Megan have three children, Cameron 16, Desmond 15, and Madison 11 and all are members of Jesse Lee Church.

Over the years the Couri family has been active in the town of Ridgefield, as well as at Jesse Lee. The family, along with another couple, founded and operates Founders Hall, a Senior Center with over 3000 active members.

At Jesse Lee, the family has been involved in many projects. These include the setting up and furnishing of the parlor at Wesley Manor, the redecoration of the Narthex, the painting of the sanctuary, the setting up of the Memorial Garden as well as the doors from the Narthex to the garden. The family was very active in helping Jesse Lee with the purchase of the Carriage House from the Odd Fellows.

Both Couri families were married at Jesse Lee. Elaine has many fond memories of Jesse Lee on both Catoonah and Main Street as well as in its current location. The Couri's were very active with the Yankee Peddler Fair and baking apple pies for sale at the church. John has served on the SPRC committee as well as being president of the board of trustees. Chris, as a youth went to ASP several times, and attended Sunday school.

The Couri family is very pleased to have the main room at the Carriage House be named "Couri Hall" and hopes that the Couri's will continue to be close to Jesse Lee for generations to come.

Elaine & Dan Winward

Elaine grew up in Tarrytown, New York and attended church there with her family. Her grandfather Rev. Robert Leon Mauterstock was pastor at the time. She was an athletic child and was waterskiing when she was 12 years old when a photo of her on the water revealed the "S" curve of scoliosis. Elaine's parents took her to a specialist in NYC and she had surgery to correct the spinal curve. Her healing process required a long recuperation at home in a torso cast. She participated in classes at Sleepy Hollow High School via a walkie-talkie device. She remembers the day the cast was sawed off her; she felt like a turtle without a shell! She returned to high school and made the cheerleading team.




After graduating from Sleepy Hollow High School, she got a job at TWA at the executive offices on Third Avenue in New York City. Elaine met Danny at their mutual best friend's wedding. Elaine and Dan were married at the Tarrytown Methodist church in 1970. It was there, on their wedding day, that she met Danny's grandmother Lizzie Tarbell, (see picture) who had come down from Akwesasne, which is the St. Regis Mohawk reservation in upstate New York. Lizzie had her best Sunday hat on that day and Elaine still has this special hat today. Lizzie lived with Dan's mother (Mohawk) and father for a few years on Mohawk Road in Ossining. Elaine, Dan and young son Matt would visit every Sunday. They would find Dan's Grandma Tarbell in her room reading the Bible. When Lizzie finally went back upstate, they wrote letters very often.



At Jesse Lee, Elaine took the Disciple Bible study course at Jesse Lee and that's when she became close friends with Dick Cuddeback. She and Dick would visit Elsie Sixby often and meet at Dimitri's for lunch or just coffee. If they didn't see each other, they'd talk on the phone. She also became good friends with Sandy Reed; they often sat together in church.

Elaine took the Lay Speaking program through our United Methodist New York Annual Conference and after completing it and receiving a certificate, found herself being invited to lead Sunday services all over Jesse Lee's UM districts, in both New York and Connecticut churches. She enjoyed leading special services for Native American Sunday, often accompanied by Rev. Doug Osgood who was a fellow member of the Conference Committee on Native American Ministry (CONAM). She also took the Healing Prayer classes with Pastor Debbi Mygatt.







Elaine recalls when her otherwise healthy mother, Grace was at home caring for Elaine's father after he had heart surgery. Her mother had a heart attack and was taken by ambulance to the hospital. As Elaine pulled into the parking lot of the hospital, she received a call on her flip phone from Pastor Bill. She vividly remembers standing in the hospital parking lot as Bill prayed with her over the phone. When the prayer was complete, Elaine went into the Emergency Room and found her father and her sister there. Her father was weeping and her sister, Joyce, was trying to stay calm after learning that their wonderful mother had passed. Pastor Bill's prayer enabled her to be strong for her father.

Elaine's father was "the best of the best." Everyone loved him, she says. He had been a First Sergeant in World War II. After the war, Elaine's father became co-owner of Roy's Deli on Main Street in Tarrytown. The store was written up in the New York Times once for the making the best sandwiches and for the wonderful way the store was decorated with antiques that local residents gave them. Some of the items were from the Rockefeller (Kycuit) Estate where her father had grown up in Pocantico Hills in NY. Her father's family (six brothers and two sisters) went to the Union Church in Pocantico as did the Rockefellers. John D. would give her father and seven siblings a dime every Sunday.

After being married, Elaine and Dan made many trips over the years to the "Rez" (reservation) to visit and stay overnight in their very small houses. Back then they only had sulphur water which was not good to drink, so they got water in jugs from the creek. There has never been, nor will there ever be, a casino on their reservation. Pastor Bill joined them on one visit and he met Dan's cousin, Chief Irv Powless. Elaine and Dan also went to weddings, funerals, pow-wows and all kinds of events at the "Rez."

After living in Tarrytown, they bought a home in North Salem on Peach Lake. Elaine was then working for doctors in Katonah and was invited by a co-worker to help at a local estate one evening for a formal dinner at Cantitoe Farm. The owners urged her to come and work for them on their estate and so she did for many years as a personal assistant. Her boss held a

Fantasy Ball at Caramoor, inviting her friends from NYC.

After that family moved back to NYC, Elaine worked for popular author Michael Crichton, for a short while, who bought the estate. He sent her and a few co-workers into NYC to see his movie, "Twister." Then for two years she worked for Chevy Chase. Chevy had dogs that were named after Saturday Night Live actors. Christmas was especially fun there and if you've seen his Christmas movie, yes, their real home was decorated inside and out.

After retiring, Elaine started volunteering at local nursing homes, visiting residents weekly, often with their Black Lab, Karta. She led church services, although she was often asked to do the Rosary since most of the residents were Catholic. The residents liked the evening Memorial services best. Her favorite resident was Elsie and they became best friends. Elaine visited Elsie weekly for almost 20 years until she died two years ago.

Dan had been in the Marines. When he got out of the service, he taught history in a local high school for a while but then got a job at General Foods, then Phillip Morris. He had an unfortunate fall while at work and being examined for that, was diagnosed with Parkinson's which was caused by contaminated water on the Marine base where he served years prior.

Elaine and Dan have lived happily on Peach lake in North Salem since 1974. With Danny having Parkinson's, he falls now and then, but they have some wonderful neighbors who come over to help him up. He also has a recurrence of cancer. She says thanks to the wonderful Jesse Leers who currently are bringing dinners to him once or twice a week. She's grateful for the availability of live streamed church services and for living in a wonderful neighborhood.

It is said that home is where the heart is and she says her heart is truly grateful that she is exactly where she is.




FARMERS MARKET IS COMING TO RIDGEFIELD IN JULY

Jesse Lee Appalachia Service Project's 2023 mission trip is two months away, and we are busy busy getting ready, with lots of planning and training.

We expect to have about 180 youth and adults traveling to two counties in Virginia July 1-9.

Quick refresher: ASP is a national Christian volunteer organization founded by Rev. Glenn "Tex" Evans, a Methodist minister, in 1969. Since then, some 437,000 volunteers from across the nation have participated in

weeklong mission trips to repair 19,000 homes in West Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, Virginia and North Carolina. This is the 39th year for Jesse Lee ASP.

It's too late to sign up for the trip but you can still help by paying us to wash your car. Car washes are each Saturday in front of Jesse Lee, and funds raised will help us to rent a fleet of minivans to caravan everyone down to Appalachia and back. The vans also will be used daily by each work crew.

Additionally, Jesse Lee ASP gratefully accepts direct contributions toward the needed number of vans. Inquire at church with Deb Ahle, Steve Coppock or Peter Seirup.

Besides the car washes in May, you also may see weekend skills trainings in Jesse Lee's back parking lot. Teen and adult volunteers – both those going down to Appalachia, as well as a smaller group volunteering for an "at-home" week of local home repairs – get hands-on practice using their tools while building wheelchair-ramp panels. These sessions give everyone some practical experience before we go, while also – a win-win situation – giving Jesse Lee's Spirit Builders ready-made ramp sections when the call comes in for a needed wheelchair ramp.






The Jesse Lee Day School swung into spring and enjoyed the warm weather! We were buzzing with learning about all that spring brings and enjoyed time with friends.



Resurrecting Buildings Transforming Lives



It is hard to express how exhilarating it was to return from six weeks in the sunny south to be reunited with the Spirit Builders. They are just so uplifting to be with!

April was a busy month and for once, most of the ramps we built were in Ridgefield. This makes moving material, tools and volunteers to and from the sites much easier.

We were rained out on April 1 so we worked the second Saturday of the month between Good Friday and Easter instead building 73 foot-long ramp. A ramp can be thought of as a little resurrection of its own since it allows an otherwise shut-in person to re-experience mobility and fresh air. This fellow with Parkinson's was at a loss for words to sufficiently express his joy at having an easy way to get in and out of his home.

Believe it or not, two days before that Saturday, the Thursday workers built a 120-foot ramp for an elderly woman who could no longer navigate her front steps. With railings on both sides of the new ramp, she has the option of using a walker, trying to walk alone or opting for her wheelchair.

We also provided a proper exit platform and set of steps from the house to the garage of a woman with Multiple Sclerosis to extend her time before a wheelchair will be necessary.

Spirit builders also built a 56-foot ramp for a bed ridden elderly man in Wilton so he can be transported by wheelchair to doctors appointments.

We are looking forward to making strategic renovations to the home of a senior this Spring, so that they can better enjoy their home in the time remaining.

Each year at this time we make a huge purchase of lumber so ASP can build new ramp sections as their skills training. Finally, the lumber prices have come back down to a reasonable level after the almost 200% Covid surge. Yippee!

God blesses us to have fun being a blessing.

- \$214k operating income from unrestricted giving, facility donations & transfers, and parsonage rental
- \$31k directed donations (to be used this year or held for future)
 - > primarily Jesse Lee Legacy Fund bequest and Spirit Builder donations
 - > smaller donations support church programs and maintenance


Outflows:


- Regular operating expenses of \$270k exceeded operating inflows as expected and budgeted
 - Reserves exist to cover deficit of this level for approximately one more year after this year
- \$9k directed donations/current grants used; \$22k directed donations/grants held for the future use
 - > \$2k supported Maintenance of church properties
 - > \$2k supported church programs primarily Music Ministry
 - > \$5k supported Missions and Service primarily Spirit Builder ramp builds
 - > \$22k to be used as designated in the future for property maintenance
- \$36k of funds set aside in previous years were used
 - Personnel grants for Communications and Pastoral Renewal Leave
 - ➤ Maintenance, primarily refresh Carriage House and Couri Hall
 - Music Ministry Grant
 - Missions and Service primarily for preparation of Shoeboxes and support for local partner ministry


Summary:

- Spent \$70k more than we received; reduces our total reserves; approximates anticipated reduction
 - ≥2023 budget anticipates use of ~160\$k operating reserves & staffing grants
 - ➤ Budgeting process also anticipated ~\$100k use of maintenance reserves
 - >Other Reserves are anticipated to be used but also replenished throughout the year

Year to Date Actual v Budget

As you can see from the charts:

- our inflows approximate budget
 - o giving approximates budget
 - o giving slightly lower than prior year
- our expenses also approximate budget

Top chart shows expenses significantly in excess of inflows, as expected:

 overall annual expenses greater than inflows is budgeted and expected

Reminder: we budgeted for ~\$160k deficit spending in 2023 at January 2023 Charge Conference.

- Grants allow us to step out in faith as we reach out to our community and to each other to share the love we know from God
- Reserves exist to cover deficit of this level for approximately one more year after this year

Thank you to all who submitted a pledge card for 2023. With continued financial pressures, it is helpful to be able to estimate our inflows more accurately. This will inform our future spending decisions as we anticipate continued deficit spending under the current income levels.
